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

Board meeting. On June 13, the VA board held its quarterly board meeting and among meeting items that were discussed was setting up some type of online method to store all of the VA data, possibly creating a Facebook page, and how to handle reimbursement checks over \$100, since our board members live all over the US. Ed Greany (Membership) presented a detailed report of the Association membership.

1st VA letter. One of the Victoria Association's long-time member, Sid Gough, sent me a copy of a September 12th, 1985, and a November 19, 1985, letter from Charlie Viosca, the Victoria Association's founder. In the September 12th letter Charlie states that there are 12 members of the Victoria Association. These letters are the earliest correspondence of Victoria Association. Sid was one of the original 12 members.

New VA Secretary Needed

The Victoria Association Is looking for a member who would be willing to join the board of directors as the Secretary. Below are the general responsibilities of the Secretary from the By-laws.

SECRETARY. The secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the members of the Board of Directors. This may be by copies of the E-mail meetings. The secretary must be the custodian of the corporate records and of the seal of the corporation and see that the

seal of the corporation is affixed to all documents, the execution of which on behalf of the corporation under its seal is duly authorized in accordance with provisions of these Bylaws; keep a register of the post office address of each member which shall be furnished to the secretary by such member; and in general perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him/her by the Board of Directors.

At this time the board meets 4 times per year over Zoom. The Victoria Association by-laws require that we have a Secretary. Please let me know if you are interested in joining the Victoria Association board and take on the important position of Secretary.

How I found my Model A Ford Victoria

Ron Hodgins is one of our newest members. He sent the story below and some pictures of his Victoria along with his membership application. His Victoria Leatherback is featured on the cover of this issue of the Bustle. After reading Ron's story, you can decide....Barn Find or Family Heirloom!

My Victoria by Ron Hodgins

My Victoria was bought from Robert L, Morse, Leake County Supervisor about 1958 by my father, Hubert Hodgins. The last time it was driven was when my dad drove it to the Neshoba County Fair in 1973, 50 years ago this year and it has been stored since. We just decided to get it out and get it running. It saw its first light of day June 8th of 2023. With the help of my friend Billy "Red" Watts, we got it started for a quick trip around the backyard on June 17th, just a bit over one week!

I started fixing her up by buying tires, a water pump, new coil and ignition parts. I told Red that the goal was to have it ready for this year's Fair as the world's best 93-year-old barn find. Red thought it might be possible. I had the rims sandblasted, painted and new tires mounted. The seats and door panels still have the original green mohair upholstery. The car was painted black about 65 years ago over the original Brewster Green and Black. The original apple green pinstripe is still on the tank.



We plan to continue mechanical improvements as needed. It may never be painted but will remain as an excellent example of a factory original classic Ford.

Technical Talk with Chuck Christensen

This is a reprint of an article written by Bob Bidonde for the Bustle. If you are a LONG TIME member, you may recognize it as it was published many years ago.

Misconceptions About The 190A: By Bob Bidonde

<u>Not Correct:</u> Original buyers had a choice between the Leather-Back and Steel-Back Victoria body styles. Contrary to what has been previously published, the data in the table of Surviving Model "A" Ford 190A Victoria Coupes implies that the Ford Motor Company did not offer buyers a choice between the Leather-Back and the Steel-Back.

The Leather-Back was the first production body style, and it appears that the changeover to the Steel-Back started at various Ford branch assembly plants in early 1931. However, it is possible that a few Ford branch assembly plants may have had Leather-Backs and Steel-Backs at the same time during the changeover period enabling some salespeople to offer a choice. The specific changeover date by the Murray Corporation is unknown.

Not Correct: All Victorias should have quarter window shades. The Chicago Branch Service Letter of 4-3-31 and the Indianapolis Branch Service Letter of March 13, 1931 state that the quarter window shades were no longer being supplied as standard equipment in Victorias and Town Sedans. The Indianapolis Branch Service Letter of March 13, 1931 also states that the tassel on the rear window curtain was replaced with a tab.

Maybe Not Correct: All Victorias should have pin stripes on the gas tank. The Indianapolis Branch Service Letter of March 13, 1931 states that the pin stripe on the cowl tank finish panel is no longer being applied. If the pin stripe was applied by the branches, then its application was inconsistent because it appears that not all branches received a similar letter. If the pin stripe was applied by the Murray Corporation, then all Victorias would lack the pin stripe on the gas tank about March 1931 and subsequent production.

Not Correct: All Victorias should have sun visors. The Chicago Branch Service Letter of February 27, 1931 and the Indianapolis Branch Service Letter of March 13, 1931 indicate that the right (passenger's) sun visor was discontinued as standard equipment in the Victoria, but it would be available for dealer installation. Similarly, the Indianapolis Branch, in its letter of April 3, 1931, states that the right visor would be made available to dealers for installation.

Subsequently, the Chicago Branch Service Letter of April 10, 1931 states that the right sun visor was reinstated. Then on April 27, 1931 the Indianapolis Branch informed its dealers via a service letter that the right visor was reinstated in production in the 160D Town Sedan, the 160C Deluxe Fordor and the 190A Victoria.

Not Correct: Briggs built Victoria bodies. All of the surviving Victorias on record were made by the Murray Corporation of America in Detroit, Michigan. There are no confirmed production Victorias made by Briggs or by any other body manufacturer. Evidence that disassembled Victorias were shipped from the United States to Ford branches in other countries is in a photograph that can be seen on Page 27 of the November - December 1992 Issue of the Restorer. Thus, a reasonable conjecture is that all 190A Victorias were built by Murray including those that were assembled at Ford branches outside of the United States.

<u>Correct:</u> All Victorias should have the same type of locks. The Indianapolis Branch Service Letter of November 26, 1930 informed its dealer's that a new series of locks requiring only one key had been adopted on the Victoria using Key Series A-1301 to A-1550. Lock Set A-11569 included one ignition lock with the conduit plus one extra lock cylinder (for the passenger's door).






Victoria front seats, rear support adjustable stud
