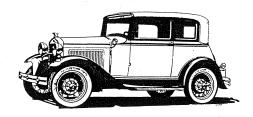

(I was asked if the early Leatherback had all three shades. I have no date data on this but I think most Victoria's had all three except when Ford cut out several items such as the passenger side door pocket, visor and probably the ½ window shades. Two months later after so many complaints, Ford put them back. The dates I have are April & May of 1931. If any of you can correct or update this information, please write to me.)

REAR SHADE \$30 each.

QUARTER WINDOW SHADE \$27 each.

If you want the hem sewn in on the bottom to place the stick in the shade, add \$2 per shade.

Jacquie will ship the shades to me for shipping to you and there will not be the original \$10 charge she quoted. I expect I can do it for \$4 per order (not per shade) so add \$4 to each order.

Make your check to: VICTORIA ASSOCIATION. I will deposit the money in the association account and keep track of it. When the shades come in, I will ship them to you.

DEADLINE * DEADLINE TO PLACE
YOUR ORDER AND SEND ME THE MONEY
IS: NOVEMBER 15th. After that date,
you will be out of luck. On
November 16th I will phone the
final order to Jacquie. Also, this
is a one time order. I do not plan
to repeat this order again.

Jacquie tells me that if I order by November 16th she can order the material and make the shades and can ship them to me by the end of January.

You should be made aware that the shades you are purchasing are only the cloth shades. They do not come with the rolers or hardware.

I have had a few inquitries as to the rollers and hardware. If you can find originals at a swap meet, this would be better. If not, you can find these items at LeBaron Bonney or Snyder's. The finish should be BUTLER so you may have to have them re-plated.

REMEMBER * REMEMBER, It's not that you are on the list that counts, it is me receiving the money. No money, no shades.

VICTORIA WOOD GRAIN PATTERN

Martin Ottersberg asked about the Victoria wood grain pattern. All the information I have on the Victoria is that it was Mahogany. I had my Victoria done in a beautiful mahogany wood grain pattern and it was marked down by the judges in a Texas Tour car judging. The judges are not familiar with everything they need to know to be good judge and particularly when it comes to specialty cars like the Victoria. I notice in the photos of Walt Ramsey's Victoria that he has a mahogany wood grain pattern like mine. As you may well be aware of, the mahogany is a fine grain wood. Most judges are use to seeing the common Model A wood grain job that is usually more course.

I would like to ask ALL ORIGINAL VICTORIA owners to let me know what wood grain pattern they have. Please, it must be original.

When I hear from you members, I'll print something on this in the January newsletter.

Somewhere near to \$15,000 minimum. I don't know of anyone willing to take up this financial task.

GASOLINE VALVE

I have looked into the gasoline shut off valve as used by me in my **TOURING** Model A Victoria.

This valve works effortlessly and doesn't leak. It has a Teflon ball inside. Smooth operating.

It is made in Italy by "Gia Comini," and is distributed in the USA by: B & K Industries, Inc., 655 Wheat Ln., Wood Dale, Il 60191.

The ½ size is what you want as they make several sizes. Any good hardware store should have this valve but if you can't find it, you can write the distributor for the Dealer nearest you.

You will have to obtain some brass fittings to adapt, it to the Model A. Also, I recommend steel fuel line tubing for gasoline. Hydraulic brake line tubing works just fine.

If you use this valve, I know you'll like it. So far, I have used three and no problems. I know of many being used in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area.

Roy Reger of Aurora, CO. wrote to inform me of an Epoxy filler that conducts electricity and thereby is able to be plated over.

This material is Metal Set A-4 and manufactured by: Smooth-On, Inc., 1000 Valley RD., Gillette, NJ 07933 (210) 647-5800.

Again, if you can not locate this material, write them for the name of the dealer nearest you.

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1931 ORIGINAL MODEL A VICTORIA

I bought my 1931 Victoria in September 1987, on Whidbey Island, Washington about 40 miles North of Seattle in Puget Sound. The owner had actually advertised the car in September 1986 in the Seattle Times. The small advertisement appeared once and went as follows: '31 Model A Victoria, orig, exc 33K, Beaut \$(price deleted) OBO.

I called the owner and after asking many questions, determined that the car was quite original with top material on the roof and back. I made an appointment to see the car, and a few days later caught the State Ferry from Mulkilleo to Columbia Beach on Whidbey Island. When I first saw the car I was very pleased to view an outstanding Maroon Leatherback Victoria. After examination and driving the car, I was very enthused and made an offer to buy which was not accepted. The owner decided to wait for other offers, and I left, of course, very disappointed. I noticed the ad did not appear again in the newspaper, but in about two weeks I called the owner who still had the car, but decided not to sell. I told him I would like to discuss it further and we agreed to meet in Seattle in a few weeks. Over the ensuing months we continued to talk and I learned more about the Victoria.

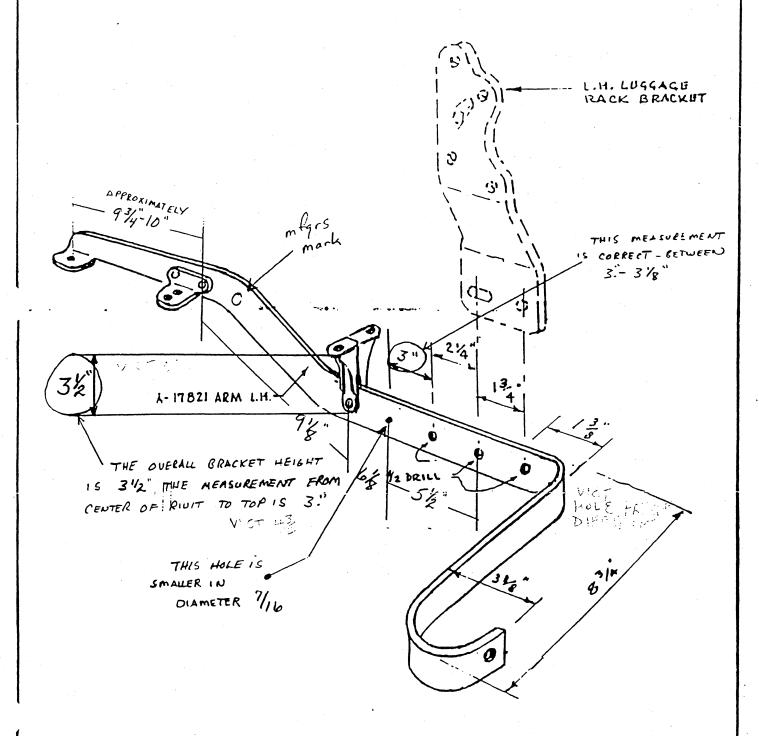
Originally sold in Marysville, Washington the car had been purchased by the owner's father when still quite new and was used as a family car for short trips. The owner had received the car from his father's estate and, not wanting to drive very much, stored the car in a heated garage, covered and on jack stands. Periodically the car was started and driven a few hundred feet back and forth on the access road.

The brown mohair interior of the Victoria is completely original with the exception of the front carpet. I found original woodgraining, striping on gas tank, visors, curtains and windshield wiper all in excellent condition. The mileage on this early Victoria is 33,500 miles with the majority of the parts original including the pop out switch, horn and carburetor.

Approximately one year after the ad appeared, the owner decided it was time to sell the Victoria and we made a deal. When completing the paper work, I was presented with two sets of original keys and Owners Manual. I've only done minor reconditioning since I've owned the car such as a new front carpet and replacement of the cut-out, shocks and hoses. The upper body was repainted black with a new stripe and the Tacoma Cream wheels were also painted black.

The Victoria has been a real pleasure to own and drive. We recently attended the Northwest Regional Meet in Calgary, Canada where a First Place was awarded, and a nice tour to Banff was enjoyed.

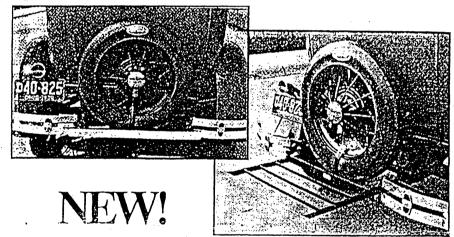
VICTORIA ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER

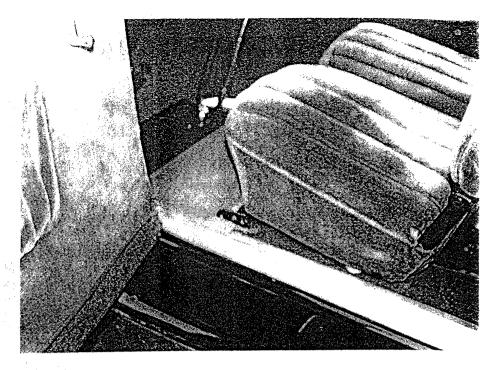

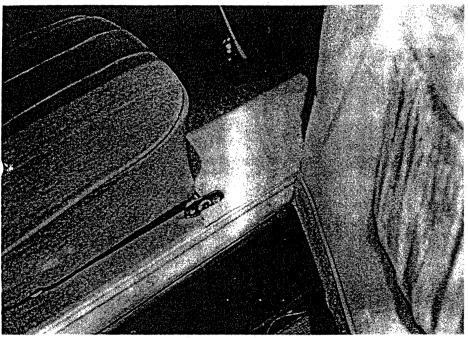

FORD VICTORIA

A De Luxe Cype of Unusual Appeal The Model A Victoria was introduced during harsh economic times (late 1930) in an attempt to boost sales by offering a wider diversity and more appealing selection of body styles. As for sales literature dealing exclusively with the Victoria, there are 4 collectible varieties. Cover I on all of them is the same, as depicted here (the original is 7" wide by 10" tall). There is a pale yellow, rectangular background around the upper title; the text is B&W. The 4 varieties differ in two respects: two show a steelback Victoria on Cover III and two others portray a softback Victoria. Each of these. in turn, appears without an F-number and also with F-59. None are dated:

Driver side of the Ramsey Victoria. Note the three hole adjustment bracket holding the seat to the floor.

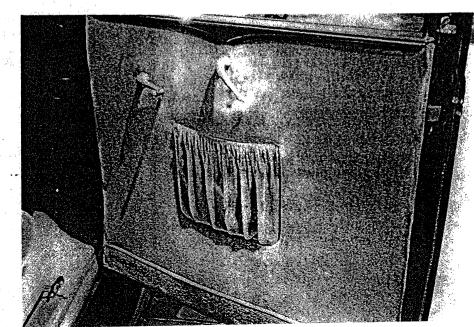




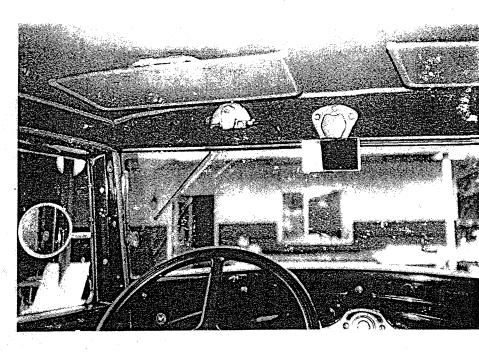
Passenger seat side showing the three hole bracket on this side also.

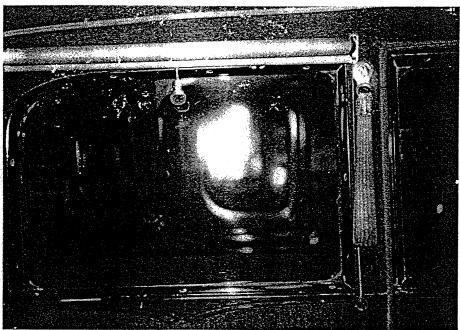
A good view of the window and door handles. An excellent view of the side panel and pocket.

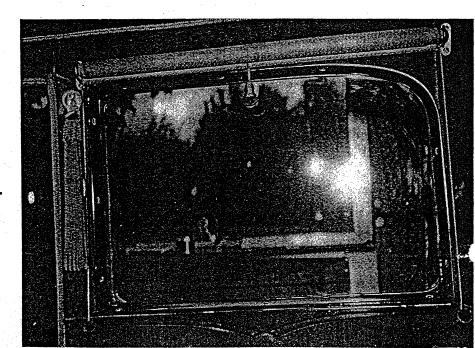
Three good photos of Walts Victoria interior showing the visors, mirror and windshield wiper. See - P4 where he mentions the chrome wiper.

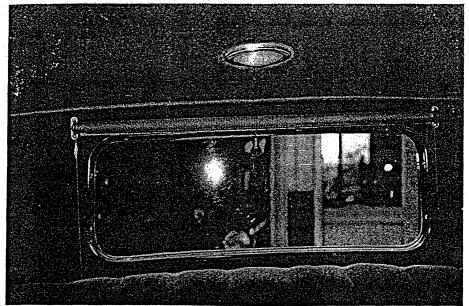




These two photos of Walts Victoria show the right and left quarter windows and the shades as well as the assist straps.

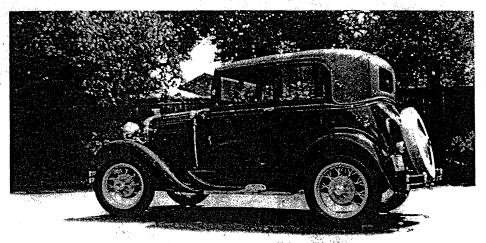
I'm sorry the mahogany woodgraining on the garnish molding doesnot show up as good as it is.

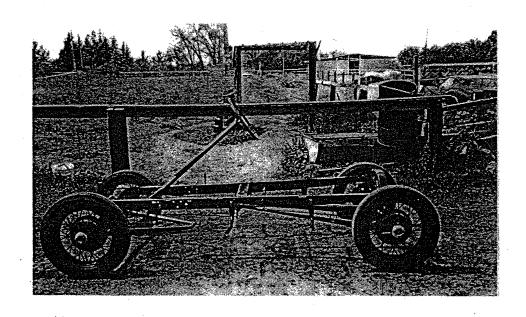




This shot of Walt Ramsey's Victoria showing the dome ligh and the rearshade. Notice the trim around the back panel and the headliner.

This is a photo of Walts car as it is with the exception of the wheels, they are now black.



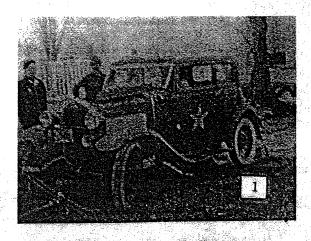


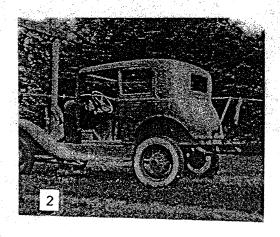
This photo shows the Victoria of Mel & Wilma Hodde. They live in Atwater, California. The restoration is slow but

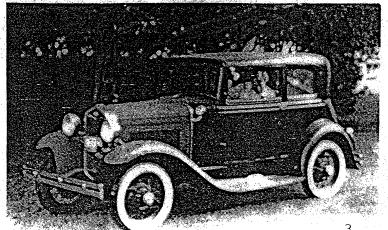
