Victoria authenticity

There were several changes made to the Victoria in mid to late June. The front seats of the Victoria were changed from the original style (3-hole adjustment on the driver's seat) to the same seats as used in the 400A. They are a sliding driver's seat and a fixed position passenger seat. The late seat's seat back cushion came much closer to the seat bottom cushion.

At about the same time, the front seat back hinge metal paint was changed from black to a chocolate brown. Also, the door panels were changed by adding a stitch pattern to the cloth area and the center binding between the door cloth and the bottom carpet was removed.

Technical Talk

How Much Gas Do We Have?

Have you ever been on the way back from a tour or car show late in the evening and suddenly wonder how much gas you have? Can we get home? The original dash light sometimes just doesn't illuminate the gas gauge very well. You strain to see what the gas level gauge is telling you, taking your attention away from the road?

Peter Leif of Milton Massachusetts has found a novel solution. Probably each of us has gone from incandescent lights to LED's in our homes, so why not in our Victorias! Peter purchased these flexible LED lamps on line. They have a built in on off switch and were very reasonable, being just \$1.66 each. The catch is that Peter had to buy 20 of them at a time. Peter found that not all of them functioned!

The power supply for these lights was intended to come from a computer by plugging it into the USB port. The power to actually light this item up is right in the range of our Victoria's 6 volt systems. Peter merely cut off the USB plug and used a crimped-on plug, to tie it into the Victoria's power. As with most LED's, there is only one way to wire them so if you power it up and the light doesn't come on, switch the wires.



As you can see, the light is quite bright and you can adjust the beam of light in any direction. Perfect for checking directions on a map (does anyone still use maps?) or to allow your co-pilot to read the next riveting page from the Bustle, Restorer or the Model A News or the latest issue of Hemmings!

Perhaps a compact portable light could be made by attaching a pair

of long wire with alligator clips? It could be put in a zip lock bag and tucked in in your bustle. As long as your problem is not a dead battery, it would be helpful!
