How I found my Model A Ford Victoria

Our first story was submitted by John and Elaine Hoffman.

My Name is John Hoffman. My wife Elaine and I have been members of MARC for eleven years. We also belong to the Calumet Region, that meets in Chicago. We are volunteers at the Model "A" Museum at the Gilmore in Michigan. We own a 1930 Deluxe Roadster, 1931 Special Delivery and now the 1931 Victoria. We will be selling the roadster because there is only room for two Model A's in our garage.

The Victoria is painted Ford Maroon and black. It has Vermilion pinstriping and wheels. The interior is a green mohair and dual side mount spares. My friend and neighbor D. J. Stonerock of Thornton, Illinois owned it for about six years. He belonged to the MARC Highland Region in Indiana. He became very ill last year. I had told him years before (after helping him time the distributor) that if he ever wanted to sell it, I would be interested. He remembered and I bought the car. Sadly, DJ passed away a couple months ago.

DJ bought the car from another Highland Region member, Dave Wright. Dave told me he bought it from a man 30 years ago who had to sell it because of divorce. He lived in West Chicago, IL. It was all black then with Apple Green wheels. It came with hydraulic brakes and a 1980's F-150 speed transmission, fourth gear being overdrive. The paint was rough so a neighbor of his undertook to repaint it. Dave always liked Ford Maroon, and chose that color. After sanding off the old paint they found that Maroon was the original paint color.

Dave also had the engine rebuilt by Antique Engine Rebuilding and he thinks it has a Snyder's high compression head. He and his wife went on many tours with the Vicky. One all the way to Nova Scotia and then another to the Blue Ridge Mountains. He said it will go 70 mph on a flat road. I'll bet his wife wasn't in the car when he did 70!

So far, I have had to replace the cylinder head gasket. Coolant was spewing out of the old gasket at the front of the engine when I test drove it. And the hydraulic brakes are giving me fits, so I'm gathering parts to replace them with original mechanical brakes and use new cast iron drums. The Vicky will be out on the road soon again burning gas and wearing out rubber with many miles of smiles ahead.

This next Victoria story was sent along by Mike and Janet Leighton.

First, let me thank you for letting me join your Association. I am a long time Model A fan, owner and MAFCA member. I currently have a 1928AR Roadster (my first restoration in 2006), a 1929 Fordor (my second restoration), a 1930 Tudor (my current restoration project), and now my 1931 Victoria. I have also owned and refurbished others cars, engines and miscellaneous assemblies to keep the "A"s on the road.

I first bought the Victoria in 2018 from a man who bought a house to flip. The car came with the house. It was in decent shape but it needed a lot of work. I spent about a year bringing it back to life and making it safe to drive on the road. This is what I like to do. One of my best friends really liked the car so I sold it to him in 2020. After his passing, I bought it back. I hope to keep this car in my collection and drive for many years to come.



I have done some safety upgrades but have not yet determined the best way to install seat belts. Any advice?

Technical Talk with Chuck Christensen

Update on the Victoria Supplement to the Restoration Guidelines.

The MARC and MAFCA Judging Standards committees have hired a person to take the next Guidelines updates and put them into a digital printable form. The Victoria Supplement will be available when the update is offered for Sale. It may be even produced in color!

The Supplement has been a 4 plus year project, with input from many people, to try and understand the manufacturing of the Victoria body by the Murray Body Co. It covers all of the detail changes that happened during the production time period. It covers the 2 body styles, 3 different upholstery trims, 3 different carpet patterns, 2 styles of front seats and a lot of other details. Bill Cilker with the assistance of many others, used 8 unrestored, original Victorias as data points to help pin point interior changes. Their body numbers are used to show approximately when a change happened. This is the first Supplement dedicated to the Victoria and it will help people restoring a Victoria to install the interior correctly.

Did you know that there are 3 spare tire support braces used in the Victoria. There was an early triangular one that was used for the first few months, then there was a much better one used on the Leather backs. The Steel backs used one similar to the second Leather back version but it attached to the upper wood frame differently.


Wanted
